


Over half of global income variability attributable to country of residence and income distribution










Figure 3. Top 20 destinations (left) and origins (right) of international migrants in 2019 (millions)




Share of migrants among the population, 2015




Migrant slavery in Libya: Nigerians tell of being used as slaves

- •BRAC's Targeting the Ultra Poor (TUP) as the development interventions with the strongest long-term positive effects
- Income gain from allowing beneficiaries of TUP to work in high productivity countries—40 times larger
- Implication: "Simply allowing more labor mobility holds vastly more promise for reducing poverty than anything else on the development agenda."

- No documented case of declines in GDP or substantial declines in public service provision in destination countries caused by immigration








Effects of migration in destination countries




