• (Gradual) decline in the quality of democracy



















Total income growth by percentile across all world regions, 1980-2016



#### Party Polarization 1879-2013 Distance Between the Parties First Dimension





#### Populism


- Populist rhetoric:

#### Populism in Brazil

- Jair Bolsonaro's victory in 2018 elections
- Erosion of democratic institutions:
  - (Re-)militarization of government
  - Systematic use of misinformation
  - Alteration of political norms
  - Weakening of political and judicial bodies



#### Populism in the United States

- Donald Trump's election victory in 2016
- Disregard for democratic norms
- Erosion of democratic quality

#### Takeaways

- Recent (third) wave of democratic backsliding following impressive spread of democracy in the preceding two centuries
- Attractiveness of populism as apparent panacea to political and socioeconomic ills
